2025 CIRCLE OF CHANGE

DANNY MAYFIELD CHAMPION OF CHANGE: June Rostan

The Danny Mayfield Champion of Change Award honors a leader in our community who has championed an initiative or campaign whose goal is to change conditions that create injustice. This year's award goes to June Rostan for 50 years of working for social justice especially in the areas of labor justice and equality.



HEART OF CHANGE AWARD: Lee Ann Swarm

The Heart of Change award was envisioned as an award to honor those who are often behind the scenes working to strengthen social change organizations and causes. We have resurrected this award (which was retired in 2013) for our 40th Anniversary in order to honor Lee Ann Swarm for her tireless dedication to Community Shares and quite a few of our member groups with both her time and financial support.

INSTITUTION FOR CHANGE: The Bottom

The Institution for Change award honors a business or institution that demonstrates socially conscious practices in the community. This year's award goes to The Bottom, a multi-use space for fostering change, building community, celebrating culture, engaging the creativity of Black people through curated events, ongoing projects, shared resources and physical space and to provide a sense of Black safety.



CAMPAIGN FOR CHANGE: Public School Strong Tennessee



This year's Campaign for Change award honors Public School Strong Tennessee for their work to stop private vouchers from defunding public education in favor of private, making education less accessible, and killing jobs in our state. PSS is a coalition of parents, students, educators and community members who are committed to honest, equitable and fully funded public schools.

The Community Shares story

FORTY YEARS AGO there were great organizations in Tennessee working to make change and trying to figure out how to get the money to do so. Save Our Cumberland Mountains, The Carpetbag Theatre, Knoxville Recycling Coalition (under the auspices of the Knoxville Community Food Cooperative), Knoxville Communications Co-op, and the Legal Environmental Assistance Foundation put their heads together to try and figure out a better way of raising money that bake sales and car washes.

Through the National Committee for Responsive Philanthropy, they learned about organizations what were raising money from donors in the workplace for social change organizations. (NCRP had been working since the late 70s to loosen the United Way monopoly on workplace fundraising and in effect, open up this type of giving to organizations who work to create progressive social change rather than the United Way standard of funding only direct service charities.)

There were a lot of skeptics who felt that this could not work in Tennessee—especially Knoxville. After all we're a conservative town in a conservative state and we were going to try and get regular people to give money to change makers and to get businesses to agree to let us solicit their employees. But they decided to give it a try, and they came up with the name Community Shares, the slogan "A World of Change in Our own Backyard," and got the University of Tennessee to agree to let them participate in the Campus Chest campaign alongside United Way. They raised about \$6000 that year but more importantly they proved that regular people would give money to help create change.

Over the next 40 years, one dollar at a time, one donor at a time, we have raised more than \$12 million for Tennessee social change organizations. Instead of focusing only on the wealthiest few who are able to make the largest gifts, we've consistently reached out to new donors and broadened the definition of the word "philanthropist" to include all who give.Community Shares has changed a lot over the last 40 years, but our values remain the same.

- We value choice in giving in workplace fundraising.
- We value working for progressive social change made on a systemic or institutional level in communities throughout Tennessee.
- We value justice, fairness and equality in ourselves, our member groups, and the world.
 - We value working together to create a strong statewide organization.
 - We value the trust of our donors.

Our goals are the same as well:

- To create a more just and caring community.
- To connect individual donors with organizations that are creating positive & lasting social change on a systemic or institutional level, protecting our environment and working to build a world that supports all its inhabitants.

We've come a long way in the last 40 years but social change organizations still struggle daily to raise enough money to continue their work of helping people and communities find their power and fight for justice. Together we will continue to make it possible for this great work to continue.

BEARING WITNESS:: 80 YEARS AFTER HIROSHIMA

August 2025 marks 80 years since the United States destroyed the cities of Hiroshima and Nagasaki and ushered in the nuclear age. Today, a nuclear exchange—even a "small" one—would trigger nuclear winter, a ten year famine that would render the entire Earth uninhabitable for those who survived the initial radiation blast.

OREPA invites you to join us this August as we commemorate Hiroshima and Nagaski and call for the United States to join the Treaty on the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons.

A slate of activities is being planned for the first week in August. Details will be announced on our web site <orepa.org> and our instagram account (follow us by snapping the QR code!) Events will include:

- *An evening with Hideko Tamura* who was a ten year old schoolgirl in Hiroshima when the bomb dropped

- A Names and Remembrance Ceremony on August 6 in Oak Ridge

We bear witness in East Tennessee because it started here — the Y-12 Plant produced the highly enriched uranium that destroyed Hiroshima. And because it continues here—Y-12 is still producing the thermonuclear core for nuclear weapons today.
